Arizona to Receive Another \$1 Billion-Plus Under IIJA

Arizona is set to receive another \$1 billion in funding for roads, bridges and an expanded electric vehicle network under the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act.

The funds will come from three different areas. \$1 billion will be provided via Federal-Aid Highway Appointments, a mechanism that includes the National Highway Performance Program, the Highway Safety Improvement Program, the Highway Freight Program and others.


\$45 million will be provided under a new formula for bridge repair and replacement, and \$16 million will come from the National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Program to add to the state's electric vehicle charging network. (Source)

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What Does Client Service Mean to You?

The Client Service Spectrum: Tips to Fine-Tune Your Approach

Every company thinks its differentiator is client service. You can see it in their brochures, websites, taglines and communications. "We are a client-focused firm," "Our differentiator is how we treat clients," or "Our list of repeat clients is proof of our client service" are common — for that reason, not necessarily differentiated.

Professional service firms in the design and construction industry must have good client service because that is what they do. The deliverable is a set of plans or a roadway, treatment plant or building. Still, the essence of design and construction is the delivery of a project, which is a service.

How can we refine our client service approach so our actions reflect a truly distinct level of client service?

Let us frame the conversation through reactive versus proactive client service. In today's competitive landscape, exceptional client service can be a differentiator that leads to improved retention, loyalty and long-term success. Understanding where your firm falls on this spectrum and actively moving toward a proactive approach is essential for sustainable growth and client satisfaction.

Reactive Client Service: At the reactive end of the spectrum, firms respond to client needs as they arise. Client interactions are primarily initiated by clients, often in response to issues or concerns:

- Passive Response: Firms wait for clients to raise problems or requests before acting, which can result in clients feeling underserved and frustrated.
- Limited Communication: Client interactions are typically transactional, focusing on immediate issues rather than building a broader relationship.
- 3. **Firefighting**: Even during standard design and construction phases, the firm's team is forced to continually address problems and resolve complaints, resulting in a reactive, defensive stance.

Transitional Client Service: Moving toward the middle of the spectrum, firms transition from reactive to proactive client service. They recognize the importance of being more responsive and anticipatory but may not have fully implemented proactive strategies:

- 1. **Improved Responsiveness**: Firms start to proactively address common client issues and concerns based on historical data and feedback which can reduce client frustration.
- Building Relationships: Communication becomes more relationship-oriented, with efforts to understand client needs and preferences.
- 3. **Proactive Issue Resolution**: The firm aims to prevent recurring issues by implementing process improvements and educating clients on best practices.

Proactive Client Service: At the proactive end of the spectrum, firms take a holistic approach to client service that goes beyond problemsolving and addresses clients' needs before they even realize them:

- Anticipating Needs: Firms use data analytics and market research to anticipate client needs, allowing them to provide tailored solutions and offerings.
- Continuous Communication: Communication with clients is regular, open and strategic, helping to build trust and strengthen relationships.
- Value-Added Services: Beyond addressing client requests, firms offer additional value through proactive recommendations, education and customization.
- 4. **Innovation and Partnership**: Firms actively collaborate with clients to co-create solutions, fostering a sense of partnership and mutual growth.

In summary, going from reactive to proactive means getting better at helping customers before they know they need help. By moving toward a proactive stance, firms meet client needs more effectively and foster stronger client relationships, enhance loyalty and position themselves as industry leaders.

Proactive client service is not just a strategy, and it is more than boilerplate statements and clever "client-focused" content. It is a mindset that can transform a firm's approach to serving its clients and driving long-term success.





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Chandler Engineer Updates Council on Projects

Chandler Senior Engineer John Knudson (pictured on right) recently updated the City Council on an extensive list of public works projects during a study session.

The study session agenda included 28 water/wastewater infrastructure items, including approximately 15 that involved replacing projects coming to the end of their useful lives.

One key project comes as part of an overall makeover of Gazelle Meadows Park and includes improvements to a stormwater retention pond known as Detroit Basin.

Other projects include:

- A \$14-million sewer relining project on Price Road from Elliot Road to Loop 202.
- A separate sewer relining on Price that includes a 66-inch pipe involves a pump-around and re-routing surface sewage pipe re-
- Redesigning the intersection of Dobson and Ray roads.

Knudson also told the City Council as part of the update that a longstanding project to rehabilitate the Arrowhead Water Production Facility and Pecos Surface Water Treatment Plant Surge System is nearly complete, following a year-and-a-half of work. (Source login required)

Arizona Construction Gained 3,900 Jobs in August


Arizona's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate increased to 3.8% in August, up from 3.6% for the month of July, according to the latest report published by the Arizona Office of Economic Opportunity.

The national unemployment rate increased to 3.8% from 3.5%. In August 2022, Arizona had a seasonally adjusted rate of 4.0%, while the national rate was 3.7%.

The Construction sector reported job gains of 3,900 around the state.

Arizona had a gain of 49,700 jobs in nonfarm employment for the month. "Prior to the pandemic (2010-2019), NSA nonfarm employment gained 54,000 jobs on average in August," the report states.

The private sector gained 18,000 jobs over the month, led by Private Education & Health Services adding 8,800. Government gained 31,700, mostly in the subcategory of Local Government Education, which added 22,300.



Five of the 11 sectors tracked gained jobs in August; five experienced losses. Year-over-year, seven of the 11 sectors reported gains, including Construction's addition of 7,200 jobs.

Construction Employment

Statewide construction employment totals 203,800 jobs, which increased by 3,900 from the July total. In August 2022 the sector reported 196,600.

The Arizona Construction sector features three major segments: Buildings, Heavy and Specialty Trades. There are currently 45,900 jobs in Buildings, which is up 1,700 from July and up 3,300 from August 2022. Heavy Construction gained 700 over the month, for a total of 23,400, and added 1,400 over the year. Specialty Trades increased by 1,500 over the month for a total of 134,500, and the segment gained 2,500 year-over-year.

Construction jobs in the Phoenix Metro Area (Phoenix-Mesa-Scottsdale) gained 2,800 over the month for a total of 162,200. The August 2022 number was 154,500. Metro Tucson added 300 construction jobs over the month at 20,300, which is an increase of 700 year-over-year.

Yuma, Flagstaff, Prescott, Lake Havasu City-Kingman and Sierra Vista-Douglas combine Mining and Construction jobs in reporting their job sector totals. Yuma construction jobs fell 100 for a total of 4,200. Flagstaff was unchanged at 3,000. Prescott lost 100, totaling 7,200. Lake Havasu City-Kingman was unchanged at 4,400, as was Sierra Vista-Douglas at 2,100.
