## Frye Road Bike Lanes Inch Closer in Chandler

Originally introduced in Chandler's 2020 Transportation Master Plan, a project that will implement 2.5 miles of protected bike lanes in Chandler continues to move forward.

In a <u>presentation</u> in June 2024 to the Chandler City Council Connectivity Subcommittee, Senior Transportation Planner Jason Crampton said the preliminary design, public outreach and design components of the project are complete.

According to a local news <u>report</u>, Crampton explained that the grant-funded \$15 million project would also include the need for repaying the roadway.

Neither the article nor the presentation materials identified the sources for the grant funding. The materials showed, however, the project received a \$914,000 design grant and \$13.52 million in construction grants. According to the presentation, the construction contract is expected to be awarded this fall, with construction expected next year.

The project spans Frye Road from San Marcos Park to Homestead Park. The major goals are to create a separated pathway for cyclists and pedestrians that is protected from vehicle traffic, improve connection between the Paseo Trail and downtown Chandler, and improve bicycle connection to schools and parks along the route.

A variety of different barrier types will be put in place, depending on conditions on various segments of Frye Road. No traffic lanes will be eliminated, but various half lanes currently used for parking or for vehicles to pull out of the roadway will be reworked for the bike lanes. (Source)



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## Pascua Yaqui Tribe to Create Worker Training Center

Using a \$4 million grant from the U.S. Economic Development Administration, the Pascua Yaqui Tribe plans to build a 3,200 SF worker training facility in downtown Tucson that will prepare tribal members and regional residents for work in the construction industry.

The grant will be used both to build the Pascua Yaqui Career Pivot Center and to acquire heavy equipment and simulators for apprentice training with the goal of creating approximately 135 new jobs. Students will be trained for jobs with Sonoran Pueblo Contracting, the tribe's construction company, and other area partners.

Design and engineering work is expected to begin in August. Completion is expected in late 2025 or early 2026.



#### Materials Prices Down 0.3% in June 2024

Construction input prices fell 0.3% in June 2024 compared to the previous month, according to an Associated Builders and Contractors (ABC) analysis of U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics Producer Price Index data. Nonresidential construction input prices declined 0.4% for the month.

Overall construction input prices are 1.1% higher than June 2023, while nonresidential construction input prices are 0.7% higher. Prices increased in two of three energy subcategories in June 2024. Natural gas prices were up 36.3%. The aggregate price of unprocessed energy materials was up 4.7%. Crude petroleum prices were down 0.2% for the month.

"Construction materials prices dipped in June 2024, perhaps a reflection of declining project starts in a number of construction segments and an associated dip in demand," said ABC Chief Economist Anirban Basu. "For instance, input prices fell in the multifamily segment, where many contractors indicate substantial softening of demand for their services. The same was true of input prices in commercial construction segments.

"While ABC members continue to report stable backlog as measured by the <u>Construction Backlog Indicator</u> and steady confidence as measured by the <u>Construction Confidence Index</u>, there remain reasons for concern," said Basu. "While construction input prices fell last month according to today's report, overall inflation as measured by the Producer Price Index is hotter than anticipated. The Federal Reserve is still looking for data indicating that 2% inflation will soon be re-established, so data like these may forestall much anticipated and desired interest rate cuts. That translates into higher interest rates for longer, which would be damaging to construction industry prospects." (<u>Source</u>)
