1. Introduction

1.1 Purpose of the Coordination Plan

Effective interagency coordination is the key to achieving environmentally responsible transportation decisions. The Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) regulations introduced the concepts of "lead agency" and "cooperating agency" to help streamline the environmental process, eliminate duplication in Federal, state, and local procedures, and integrate the requirements of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) with other Federal environmental review and consultation requirements.

The Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) enacted in 2005 addressed the many challenges facing our nation's transportation system, such as improving safety, reducing traffic congestion, improving efficiency in freight movement, increasing intermodal connectivity, and protecting the environment. SAFETEA-LU further defined the role of agencies involved with a transportation project receiving Federal funds. The SAFETEA-LU Environmental Review Process Final Guidance, issued November 15th, 2006, defines the role of the Lead Agency, Participating Agencies, and Cooperating Agencies.

In 2012, the provisions of Section 6002 of SAFETEA-LU were amended by Section 1305 of Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP-21) and further refined in 2015 by 1304(g) of Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (FAST Act).

Section 6002 of SAFETEA-LU requires the lead agency(ies) for any federally funded project performing an environmental impact statement (EIS) to establish a plan for coordinating public and agency involvement during the environmental review process. MAP-21 continued this requirement and the FAST Act added that the Coordination Plan is required no later than 90 days after the publication of EIS Notice of Intent (NOI) and must include a schedule.

On January 20, 2025, Executive Order (E.O.) 14154, Unleashing American Energy, directed CEQ to propose rescinding CEQ's NEPA regulations and to provide guidance on implementing NEPA. CEQ published an Interim Final Rule on February 25, 2025 in response to this direction. CEQ also has issued initial guidance on implementing NEPA in response to E.O. 14154.

The Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) will act as the lead agency for environmental review, interagency coordination, and coordination with Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) monitoring and audits. The FHWA retains some engineering decisions, project level air quality conformity determinations, and government-to-government Tribal consultation (if requested). The environmental review, consultation, and other actions required by applicable Federal environmental laws for this project are being carried out by ADOT pursuant to 23 United States Code (U.S.C.) §327 and a Memorandum of Understanding dated June 25, 2024, and executed by the Federal Highway

Administration (FHWA) and ADOT. Agency and stakeholder roles and responsibilities, which are contained in 40 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Parts 1500-1508 National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Implementing Procedures and 23 CFR Part 771 Environmental Impact and Related Procedures, are defined below. The agencies will also adhere to guidance contained in 23 U.S.C. 139 Efficient Environmental Reviews for Project Decision-Making.

This Project Coordination Plan for agency, public, and tribal involvement defines the process by which ADOT will communicate information about the study to the Cooperating agencies, Participating agencies, the public, and Tribes. The plan also identifies how input from agencies, Tribes, and the public will be solicited and considered, as well as facilitating and documenting the lead agencies' interaction with the agencies, the public, and Tribes.

This coordination plan facilitates and documents the lead agency's interaction with the public and other agencies. It describes how the coordination will be accomplished throughout the environmental review process. This coordination plan promotes an efficient and streamlined process and sound project management through coordination, scheduling, and early resolution of issues.

This coordination plan:

- identifies early coordination efforts
- identifies Cooperating and Participating agencies and stakeholders
- establishes the timing and methods for gathering Cooperating and Participating agencies' and stakeholders' input on the project's purpose and need, study area, range of alternatives, study methodologies and criteria, technical reports, findings of the draft EIS, preferred alternative, and avoidance, minimization and or mitigation strategies
- establishes the timing and methods for gathering public input on the project's purpose and need, study area, range of alternatives, issues of concern, environmental features, and findings of the draft EIS
- describes the communication methods for informing the community about the project
- establishes a conflict resolution process for the Cooperating agencies

This coordination plan was developed in conjunction with a separate Public Involvement Plan. It will be updated periodically to reflect any changes to the project schedule and other items that may require updating over the course of the project.

1.2 Background and Study Description

ADOT has prepared this coordination plan as required by Section 6002 of SAFETEA-LU for the State Route (SR) 410 Sonoran Corridor Study. SR 410 is a major new transportation corridor proposed in Pima County, Arizona. It was designated by Congress as a high-priority corridor and future interstate facility under the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act. <u>FHWA and ADOT prepared a Tier 1-level</u>

<u>EIS for this study</u>, and ADOT is now advancing it through preparation of a Tier 2 EIS. <u>The Record of</u> <u>Decision (ROD)</u> for the Sonoran Corridor Study's Tier 1 NEPA clearance was issued in 2021. The Tier 1 ROD identified Alternative 7 as the selected 2,000-foot-wide corridor alternative. (The Tier 1 study documents can be viewed here.) The current study will examine a number of 400-foot-wide alternative transportation alignments based on the selected Tier 1 alternative. No funding has been identified for right-of-way acquisition or construction of the project; however, it is being advanced through a Tier 2 EIS, in accordance with NEPA and other regulatory requirements, to further define the project development process including the identification of infrastructure needs, costs, outreach, and implementation plan strategies. This study will build upon the Tier 1 EIS and identify and evaluate the engineering and environmental considerations of various design concept alternatives for the corridor, refining the 2,000foot corridor selected in the Tier 1 EIS to a proposed 400-foot freeway alignment.




Figure 1. State Map




Figure 2. Study Area Map

The Sonoran Corridor Study Area is bounded on the west by Interstate Route 19 (I-19), and on the northeast by Interstate 10 (I-10) (Figure 1 and Figure 2). The Corridor Alternative selected in the Tier 1 EIS originates at I-19 near EI Toro Road in the Town of Sahuarita and extends east to the alignment of Alvernon Way, then heads north to Old Vail Road, terminating at Interstate Route 10 (I-10) in the vicinity of Rita Road.

The proposed Sonoran Corridor has been acknowledged in local, regional, and statewide plans to achieve identified transportation objectives. Several of these plans are listed below, with the authors in parentheses.

- City of Tucson Major Streets and Routes Map, Amended 1/20/2016
- 2019-2023 State Transportation Improvement Program (ADOT)
- FY 2025-FY2029 Transportation Improvement Program (PAG)

1.3 Project Purpose and Need

The Tier 1 EIS identified the following purpose and need for the Sonoran Corridor study:

1.3.1 Project Purpose

The overall purpose of this study is to identify a high-priority, high-capacity, access-controlled transportation corridor that will:

- Improve the existing transportation network by affording better access to growth areas and existing activity centers;
- Reduce congestion and improve LOS that is predicted for the study area in 2045; and
- Provide a system linkage between I-19 and I-10 south of Tucson International Airport (TUS) that improves mobility associated with regional, interstate, and international travel.

1.3.2 Project Need

The following needs exist within the Sonoran Corridor study area:

- Population and employment growth— the current transportation network has limited ability to service new growth plans and provide access to existing activity centers.
- Congestion reduction—an increase of congestion and significant portions of the transportation network within the study area are expected to operate at an unacceptable level of service (LOS) by 2045. Insufficient system linkage—lack of a linkage connection between I-19 and I-10 south of TUS inhibits mobility that is associated with regional, interstate, and international travel.

The Purpose and Need identified in the Tier 1 EIS (available <u>here</u>) will be refined as the study team progresses through the Tier 2 process.

2 Lead Agency/Cooperating Agencies/Participating Agencies/Stakeholders

2.1 Lead Agency

The agencies discussed in this section (except for the lead agencies) have been formally invited by letter to participate in the study. All Cooperating and Participating agencies are responsible for:

- Participating in the scoping process
- Providing comments on the purpose and need, study methodologies and criteria, and range of alternatives
- Identifying issues of concern regarding the project's impacts on the natural and human environments
- Providing timely input on unresolved issues

ADOT is the lead agency and project sponsor for this project. Pursuant to 23 U.S.C. §327 and a Memorandum of Understanding dated June 25, 2024 and executed by FHWA and ADOT, ADOT has assumed all of FHWA's project-level responsibilities under NEPA for state highway system projects, as well as environmental review, resource agency consultation, and other environmental regulatory compliance-related actions pertaining to the review and approval of projects in Arizona. ADOT's responsibilities in this role include managing the Section 6002 process, preparing the environmental impact statement, providing opportunity for Public, Tribal, and agency involvement, and approving the environmental document.

2.2 Cooperating Agencies

Cooperating agencies are specifically requested by the lead agency to participate during the environmental evaluation process for the project. NEPA regulations—codified in 23 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) § 771.111(d)—require that those federal agencies with jurisdiction by law (with permitting or land transfer authority) or with special expertise regarding any potential project-related environmental impact be invited to serve as Cooperating agencies for an EIS. A state or local agency with similar qualifications may also become a Cooperating agency by agreement with the lead agency.

The regulations require the lead agency to invite certain agencies to be cooperating; however, those agencies are not required to accept the role. Specifically, 23 CFR 771.111 (d) states that "Any such agencies with special expertise concerning the action may also be invited to become cooperating agencies. Any such agencies with jurisdiction by law concerning the action must be invited to become cooperating agencies. Should a federal agency choose to decline Cooperating agency status, that agency will automatically be considered a Participating agency whether a written response is provided or not. If a federal agency should choose to decline both Cooperating and Participating status, that agency must submit a written response stating that it (1) has no jurisdiction or authority with respect to the project, (2) has no expertise or information relevant to the project, and (3) does not intend to submit comments on the project.

In November 2024, the agencies listed in Table 1 were invited to serve as Cooperating agencies for the Sonoran Corridor Study's Tier 2 EIS. One Tier 1 Cooperating agency, U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, is not included in the Tier 2 study as the selected corridor alternative in the Tier 1 EIS does not involve Reclamation lands or facilities. The complete list of agencies invited to serve as Cooperating and Participating agencies during the Tier 1 EIS process may be found in Appendix A. The status of responses from each of these agencies is identified in the table. If new information indicates the need to request another agency to serve as a Cooperating agency, ADOT will issue an invitation to that agency.

2.3 Participating Agencies

Section 6002 of SAFETEA-LU created a category of agencies to participate in the EIS environmental review process: federal, state, tribal, regional, and local governmental agencies with an interest in the project. Nongovernmental organizations and private entities cannot serve as Participating agencies.

State, tribal, and local agencies are asked to respond affirmatively to the invitation to be designated as a Participating agency. If an agency fails to respond by the stated deadline, the agency will be considered a Participating agency. If an agency declines the invitation, the agency will be considered a stakeholder and continue to receive periodic project information.

The invited Participating agencies and their responses are shown in Table 2. In addition to those who were invited as Participating or Cooperating agencies during Tier 1 of the study; the Federal Bureau of Prisons was added as a Participating agency, as they have a facility directly adjacent to the Selected Corridor alternative. Designation as a Participating agency does not imply project support and, if applicable, does not provide an agency with increased oversight or approval authority beyond its statutory limits. Letters accepting the most recent (October 2024) invitations to serve as Participating agencies are included in Appendix C.

Meetings will be held with agencies and Tribal governments serving as Participating agencies on an asneeded basis to discuss specific subjects of interest, concerns, and recommendations. This review process will include key milestone meetings with agencies and Tribal governments serving as Participating agencies prior to the public information meetings and before the public hearings on the Draft EIS. Joint webinar updates will be held with agencies and Tribal governments serving as Participating agencies, as needed.

2.5 Stakeholders

State and local agencies that were invited to serve as Participating agencies but formally declined the invitation, as well as members of the public that have expressed an interest in the project and have provided contact information, will be included in the list of stakeholders and receive any email updates or other notifications. Any agency that is not designated as a Cooperating or Participating agency, as well as the public, will be free to comment on the study. The lead agency will take substantive comments of any interested parties into consideration throughout the study process.

2.6 Contact Information

Contacts for the invited Cooperating and Participating agencies are listed in Appendix D.

3 Coordination Activities

This section describes coordination activities to be conducted throughout the environmental review process, including initial coordination, coordination points (milestones), and distribution of information.

3.1 Early Planning Phase

On February 27, 2024, ADOT notified the Tier 1 Cooperating and Participating Agencies and project area stakeholders of a planned early agency coordination/scoping planned to be held March 27, 2024.

The Sonoran Corridor study team hosted a hybrid (virtual and in-person) early agency scoping meeting on Wednesday, March 27, 2024. The purpose of the meeting was to share information about the project and the corridor constraints and opportunities to be considered. It was also intended to allow for agency and stakeholder input on the scope of the study, as well as gather input on concerns and desires related to the project area. The meeting provided opportunities for agencies and stakeholders to ask questions and make comments.

The meeting was hosted in person at the Pima Association of Governments (PAG), 1 E Broadway Blvd. Suite #401, in Tucson, and online through Zoom. Participants could also call into the meeting if they were not able to participate in person or online. The meeting featured a presentation by the project team, followed by a question-and-answer period.

Project team members from ADOT and the WSP consultant team served as moderators, presenters, and panelists to hear comments and respond to questions during the meeting.

Additional project team staff were present to assist in facilitating the meeting and Q&A session. Participants were notified that study-related materials, including the presentation, would be made available following the meeting. The presentation was emailed to attendees on Friday, April 12, 2024.

Eleven (11) people attended the meeting in person and 66 attended virtually through Zoom. Representatives from the following agencies were in attendance:

Subsequent Study Progress Meetings were held the third Thursday of every month beginning on April 18 to present updates on the alternatives development and solicit comments on the study process to date from potential Cooperating and Participating Agency points of contact invited to the online meetings. ADOT anticipates formally initiating the NEPA process in early 2025 by publishing a Notice of Intent (NOI) in the Federal Register. This Project Coordination Plan would be updated at that time.

3.2 NEPA EIS Process Coordination Points, Information Distribution, and Required Actions

Table 4 lists key coordination points (study milestones), including which agency is responsible for activities during that coordination point and specifying the information required at each coordination point; how the lead agency will make information available to Cooperating agencies, Participating agencies, and the public; and who is responsible for transmitting that information and by what means. Table 4 also lists the anticipated date that the identified information would be distributed to the public. Note that dates in brackets are tentative or pending. Review times for documents distributed to Cooperating and Participating agencies at each coordination point are 30 calendar days, unless noted otherwise. It is important to note that the schedule is subject to change and that periodically through the EIS process the schedule in the Coordination Plan will be updated to reflect the current approach and understanding. When these changes are made to update the schedule, an email notice will be sent to the Cooperating and Participating agencies and the draft Coordination Plan will be updated on the project website.

The Sonoran Corridor Study project website has up-to-date project information. This website will be updated at each of the major milestones noted, and stakeholders will be alerted through email blasts when substantive updates have occurred (see https://azdot.gov/planning/transportation-studies/sonoran-corridor-sr-410-study).

4.1 Study Schedule

Review times for documents distributed to Cooperating and Participating agencies at each coordination point are 30 calendar days, unless noted otherwise. It is important to note that the schedule is subject to change, and that periodically through the EIS process, the schedule in the Coordination Plan will be updated to reflect the current approach and understanding. When these changes are made to update the schedule, an email notice will be sent to the Cooperating and Participating agencies, and the draft Coordination Plan will be updated on the project website.

5 Tribal Engagement

The Tier 1 study identified substantial interest from several Native American Tribes, and the Tier 2 study area is within the ancestral lands of multiple Native American Tribes. ADOT will continue to coordinate and regularly report on the study's progress with the Tribal governments throughout the EIS and Section 106 process in accordance with policies and procedures established by ADOT and/or FHWA. Section 106 consultation will follow procedures maintained by ADOT's Historic Preservation Team and 36 CFR 800. ADOT will ensure that Tribes, in particular cultural resources staff, are involved in project development beyond just the scope of the Section 106 process. Tribal governments' participation in the NEPA process and understanding the project as a whole are important to the overall process, including the development of projects' purpose and need and alternatives, as well as other project considerations, such as the identification of biological resources and environmental justice communities and impacts. ADOT will communicate with the Tribes throughout the NEPA process.

To support our commitment to working with Tribal governments, ADOT employs a Tribal relations team with two department-wide Tribal liaisons, a Native Nations Ambassador in the State Engineer's office, a Contract Agent in the Right-of-Way Group, and a Tribal liaison with ADOT Environmental Planning. Together, this team will keep Tribes informed, consulted, and aware of this project.

The Tribes were notified of the public meetings in February 2024 and will be notified about any future public information meetings or public hearings to be conducted. ADOT formally invited nine federally recognized Tribes in Arizona to be Participating agencies in the NEPA process.

ADOT will continue to hold breakout meetings as the cultural studies progress to provide status updates, discuss methodology, share technical information, and discuss findings and recommendations. ADOT will accommodate similar meetings with the other Tribes if requested.

Tribal entities that were invited to serve as Participating agencies but did not respond to the invitation will be considered Participating agencies and receive any email updates or other notifications. The nine tribes listed in Table 2 are also consulting parties per Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act and will be included in continuing consultation throughout the environmental review process.

6 Public Outreach

6.1 Outreach Conducted to Date

Public outreach was conducted in August 2024 to provide the public with an overview of the recently initiated study and solicit public input to be considered when developing the range of feasible alternatives for the Sonoran Corridor alignment, interchange locations, and other features. A public comment period was open from August 1 through September 1, 2024. A summary of the outreach conducted and input received is documented in the Public Involvement Summary Report will be made available on the project website.

6.2 Continued Outreach

ADOT developed a Public Involvement Plan for the Sonoran Corridor Tier 2 Study in compliance with FHWA and other federal and state regulations. The EIS process conducted for the Sonoran Corridor Tier 2 Study will promote informed decision-making by federal, state, and local agencies.

ADOT will continue the collaboration, communication, and cooperation between all who are involved in environmental decisions, including government officials, private businesses, and the public as the project moves through the NEPA process.

Stakeholder and public input continue to provide important insight as the project team analyzes constraints within the 2,000-foot Tier 1 Selected Corridor Alternative to identify a specific alignment for the Sonoran Corridor Tier 2 EIS and DCR. Public input will be integrated into the evaluation process before decisions are made.

7 Conflict Resolution

SAFETEA-LU provides a formal process for resolving serious issues that may delay the proposed project or result in denial of a required approval for the proposed project. ADOT or the Governor of Arizona may invoke the Section 6002 process for issue resolution at any time. However, the informal conflict resolution process discussed below should be considered the first option for issue resolution prior to invocation of Section 6002.

Should an issue come to an impasse, the general process for addressing and resolving the issue would be:

- 1. Involved parties will identify and agree on what the issue to be resolved is at the project manager level.
- 2. The ADOT manager at the area, district, or section level will initiate the conflict resolution process.
- 3. ADOT will notify the Cooperating agency manager at the regional or deputy level.
- 4. ADOT will compile and submit all pertinent information to involved parties.
- 5. Involved parties will determine whether all information necessary for issue resolution has been received.
- 6. ADOT will hold a formal meeting (involving the first three tiers of management) to resolve the issue, followed by a 30-day review/decision period.
- 7. A decision will be made, recorded, and passed on to the appropriate team members
- 8. The process is completed.

If issue resolution does not occur, a discussion of the issue and why resolution could not be reached will be submitted to the heads (administrator, director, or commander) of the Cooperating agencies for further formal review. This involves publishing a notification of the issue(s) that could not be resolved in the Federal Register, with details of meetings held to date, and an FHWA-led meeting of the heads of all involved agencies, project sponsor, governor, appropriate Senate and House committees, and the Center for Environmental Quality for resolution or further action by notified parties.

Resolution in this context means that the agencies involved agree on how to proceed so that they are able to reach decisions on matters within their authority. This agreement should be in the form of a signed document.

8 Revision History

Once finalized, changes to the Agency Coordination Plan will be logged in Table 10.

Note that if a schedule item in the coordination plan requires modification, concurrence on the schedule change is required only if the schedule is being shortened, and then only from the lead agency, not all Cooperating and Participating agencies.

Invited Cooperating Agencies

Table A- lists the eleven federal agencies invited to act as Cooperating Agencies for the Sonoran Corridor Tier 1 EIS process along with their response to the invitation. Of those, four federal agencies accepted the invitation, and seven federal agencies opted to be a Participating Agency instead. One state agency, AGFD, requested and was granted Cooperating Agency status based on its jurisdictional authority and State Trust responsibility for the management of Arizona's wildlife resources and special expertise regarding wildlife resources within the Sonoran Corridor study area. After the Reasonable Range of Corridor Alternatives was identified, the TON was also invited to be a Cooperating Agency, owing to one of the corridor alternatives crossing tribal land; however, no response was received. The BIA, although originally requesting to be a Participating Agency, was invited a second time to be a Cooperating Agency; however, they wished to remain a Participating Agency. As such, the total number of Cooperating Agencies is five. Agency responses to invitation letters and scoping input are appended to the Agency and Public Scoping Summary, which is included in the study documents on the project website¹.

The Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) is initiating engineering and environmental studies for the Sonoran Corridor between Interstate 19 (I-19) and Interstate 10 (I-10). The study area is shown in Figures 1 and 2. The purpose of this letter is to formally extend an invitation to your agency to act as a Participating Agency.

This Tier 2 Study (Sonoran Corridor) will build upon the prior Tier 1 Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) process, which concluded in August 2021 and established the general location of a new 20-mile-long highway route between I-19 and I-10 in Pima County. The Selected Alternative in the Tier 1 Record of Decision (ROD) was a 2,000-foot-wide corridor, within which subsequent Tier 2 studies would identify the specific 400-foot highway alignment.

ADOT anticipates the preparation of an EIS for the project, which will be carried out by ADOT pursuant to 23 United States Code 327. The EIS process will be formally initiated when the proposal is sufficiently developed with a preliminary description of the alternatives that the EIS and DCR will consider. The Notice of Intent (NOI) is anticipated to be published in early to mid-2025. Your agency has been identified as one that has jurisdiction and/or special expertise within the Sonoran Corridor.

With this letter, we extend your agency an invitation to become a Participating Agency with ADOT in the development of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) document for the subject project in accordance with 40 CFR 1501.8 of the Council on Environmental Quality's National Environmental Policy Act Implementing Regulations. - Participate in the NEPA process by providing early input on the purpose and need, range of alternatives, methodologies and level of detail required in the alternative evaluation and environmental studies;
- Identify, as early as practicable, any issues of concern regarding the project's potential environmental or socioeconomic impacts. Participate in the issue resolution process if possible;
- Provide meaningful and timely input on unresolved issues; and
- Participate in coordination meetings, and/or field visits, as appropriate.

Your agency does not have to accept this invitation. If, however, you elect not to become a Participating Agency, you must decline this invitation in writing, indicating that your agency has no jurisdiction or authority with respect to the project, no expertise or information relevant to the project, and does not intend to submit comments on the project.
