#### Introduction

The Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) will be conducting a Tier 2 Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) and Design Concept Report (DCR) for North-South Segment 2 from Arizona Farms Road to Interstate 10 (SR 505). Segment 1 of the North-South corridor between US 60 and Arizona Farms Road is a separate but related effort that is also underway. ADOT is currently conducting early public and agency scoping for this study to gather input on what should be considered in refining the purpose and need and preliminary range of alternatives for the North-South Segment 2 alignment, interchange locations and other features. As the study progresses to the next milestone, ADOT will be seeking public, agency and tribal government input on the preliminary range of alternatives for the highway alignment, the study purpose and need or other relevant information for consideration in developing the Tier 2 Draft EIS.





#### Title VI Accommodations

The public outreach effort was conducted in compliance with Title VI and all other state and federal guidelines approved for the project in the North-South Segment 2 Public Involvement Plan, on record with ADOT Communications.

#### **Public Meetings**

The public meetings were a significant component of the study to gather input on what should be considered when developing the preliminary range of alternatives and preliminary purpose and need for the North-South alignment, interchange locations and other features. The public meetings were advertised extensively through various methods described in the following sections. The public meeting dates, times, locations and attendance are listed in Table 1.

#### **Online Public Meeting Website**

The online public meeting website was a vital part of the study outreach process. The website allowed the public to learn about the study and review the same information from home that was presented during the public meetings. The public could also watch a recording of the public meeting presentation. The online public meeting website was launched on July 21, 2025. A third-party widget was used on the website, to allow people to view materials in their preferred language. All materials for the public meeting were posted on the website in English and Spanish. Additionally, the website offered a way for participants to provide comments on the study through a comment map, comment form, and survey.

#### **In-Person Public Meetings**

The first two public meetings were held in-person on Aug. 7 and Aug. 12, 2025. The public meetings' purpose was to give an overview of the study process, share details on existing conditions and accept public comment. The in-person public meetings were held from 5:30 – 7:30 p.m. and followed the format in Table 2.

#### MEETING FORMAT

The in-person public meetings were held as an open house in one large room. Attendees were encouraged to view display boards and roll plots to learn more about the study. Study team members were available to answer questions one-on-one. In addition, a comment area was set up with iPads and surveys, allowing attendees to submit written or online comments. A live presentation was given, followed by a Q&A session with the study team for all participants. Questions provided on a question-and-answer card were answered live during the question-and-answer session.

In addition, a pre-recorded Spanish version of the presentation was available near the comment section with headsets provided for any individuals who preferred to listen in Spanish. Spanish interpreters were available during the Q&A session and the open house portion of the meetings. Spanish translation was not requested during the in-person meetings.



#### **Virtual Public Meeting**

The third public meeting was hosted virtually through Zoom on Aug. 14, 2025, from 6:00 – 7:00 p.m. Attendees joined the virtual public meeting through Zoom on their internet browser, mobile app, or computer application or by calling into the meeting. Spanish-speaking attendees could also join by calling into the Spanish audio line. Each method of joining provided opportunities for the attendees to ask questions and provide public comments. The meeting was simultaneously held in both English and Spanish. The English audio room had 20 attendees, and the Spanish audio room had zero attendees. The virtual public meeting followed the format in Table 3.

#### **Notifications**

The development and distribution of the public meeting notifications were essential in informing the public about the study, ways to provide public comment and how to attend the in-person and virtual public meetings. The project website was included in all notifications, so the public had an avenue to learn more about the study and take the survey.

#### Survey

#### **Public Comment Review**

All comments received during the comment period were shared with the study team and reviewed for the specific issues or recommendations raised by commenters. A total of 207 comments were received by Sept. 8, 2025, the last day of the comment period, through the following methods:

- » Sixteen (16) comments through the study email
- » Forty-one (41) comments through the interactive public comment map on the study website
- » Sixty-two (62) comment forms through the online comment form
- » Eighty-seven (87) survey responses from online survey. See Survey Results for more details, and Appendix D, Survey for a full breakdown of survey questions and results.

Some of the common theme s that were found throughout the comments are listed below:

#### **Support for the project:**

- » Regional benefits
- » Economic growth
- » Appreciation for planning efforts
- » Improved commute times
- » Reduced congestion
- » Better regional connectivity

#### **Opposition to the project**

- » Concerns about urban sprawl
- » Concerns about spending priorities
- » Preference to improving existing infrastructure or developing different routes

#### **Concerns about Equity and Community Impact**

- » Effects on historic and minority communities
- » Disruption to quiet neighborhoods
- » Preservation of local character



#### **Environmental Concerns**

- » Desert preservation
- » Pollution
- » Impact on agricultural land
- » Impact on archaeological sites

#### **Route Alignment Suggestions**

- » Adjusting segment boundaries for better balance between segment 1 and 2
- » Prioritizing segment 2 over segment 1
- » Suggestions for bypasses around development and straight alignments instead of curved highway options

#### **Interchange Suggestions**

- » Request from City of Florence and State Representative Blackman to include Hunt Highway as an interchange
- » City of Coolidge requested interchange locations at Valley Farms Road and Coolidge Ave
- » Concerns about interchange spacing and access

#### **Survey Results**

The survey consisted of eleven questions – seven questions related to the study and four questions asking for contact information. In total, there were 87 responses. Full survey results can be found in Appendix D, Survey.

A summary of the survey results can be found below:

- » 57% of respondents were aware of the previous Tier 1 North-South Corridor Study
- » Some residents strongly support the corridor for traffic relief and regional connectivity
- » Requests to accelerate this project, saying it is vital to the area and that expansion will continue to happen regardless, so this needs to be built before the need arises
- » Support for the project purpose and need
- » Some opposition due to environmental, cultural, and financial concerns
- » Concerns that the freeway will encourage unsustainable growth, increase pollution, and benefit developers more than residents
- » Some questions about the curved portion of the corridor between Hunt Highway and Martin Road, suggesting that a straighter alignment would be more efficient and less disruptive to communities in the area
- » Suggestions to shift the corridor east to avoid communities
- » Suggestions to improve and widen existing highways and infrastructure such as Highway 87, Highway 79, Hunt Highway, and I-10
- » Suggestion for prioritizing rail, light rail, and rapid bus lines over new freeway construction
- » Concern over loss of farmland, horse ranches, dairy operations, and rural character
- » Requests to protect cultural and archaeological sites
- » Requests for coordination with tribal communities and inclusion of wildlife crossings
- » Some question the need for all three interchanges in proximity to one another (i.e. Martin Road, Bartlett Road, Kleck Road) suggestions to remove Barlett Road



- » Requests for interchanges at:
  - Hunt Highway<sup>1</sup>
  - E Cactus Forest Road / E Coolidge Avenue
  - · Picacho Village

#### **Questions and Answers**

Following the presentation at each of the three public meetings, a Q&A portion of the meeting was opened where the public could write a question on a question-and-answer card and have it read aloud and answered live by study team members. Oral questions were also taken during the open house portion of the meeting. The number of Q&As asked at each public meeting can be found below:

- » Public meeting #1: 22
- » Public meeting #2: 4
- » Virtual public meeting: 16 (1 verbal, 15 written)

An overview of the questions received, include the following:

- » Timeline of the project and construction and priority of this project above other ADOT projects
- » If the southern portion can be prioritized over the north portion

- » How the population and development in this area have changed since the Tier 1 study was conducted and the corridor location was chosen
- » Adding an interchange on Hunt Highway
- » Why is the route not a straight line from AJ to La Palma/Eloy?
- » Questions related to property acquisition
- » Questions related to the homes on Wheeler Road and how they will be affected, and trying to avoid going through this subdivision

#### **Next Steps**

Following the data collection and scoping stage, the Notice of Intent will be released, which will initiate the formal NEPA process, the alternatives development and evaluation where preliminary alternatives will be refined into a reasonable range of alternatives for evaluation in the EIS. A draft EIS and DCR will then be prepared, to compare the Preferred and/or Build Alternative(s) with a No Build Alternative.

Ultimately, based on the technical analysis and public, agency, and tribal nations' input, the final EIS and DCR will be developed, which will identify the Selected Alternative. In addition, a Record of Decision (ROD) will be issued, representing ADOT's decision on how to move forward with the proposed project. This study is expected to take about three years.

It is important to note that at each of the three major milestones, prior to the release of the final documents, the public will have opportunities to review the current alternatives being evaluated and provide input or comments.

1. Title Slide	Thank you for joining us for this public meeting for the North-South Segment 2 Study, from Arizona Farms Road to Interstate 10.
2. Meeting Purpose	The Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT), has begun an engineering and environmental studies on the North-South Corridor from Arizona Farms Road to Interstate 10 (SR 505), known as the North-South Segment 2 Study.
	The purpose of tonight's meeting is to introduce this study, review the Tier 1 purpose and need and to receive public input, which will be considered by the study team in the development of preliminary alternatives.
3. North-South Corridor Background	ADOT is studying a more than 50-mile-long north-to-south transportation corridor between US 60 and I-10 in Pinal County. In August 2021, ADOT released the Final Tier 1 Environmental Impact Statement, or EIS, and Record of Decision, which identified the selected 1,500-foot-wide North-South corridor. This represented a decision to move forward with the North-South corridor, following many years of environmental and engineering study, and included opportunities for public comment on the corridor alternatives.
	ADOT has divided the North-South corridor into two segments for additional Tier 2 engineering and environmental studies – Segment 1 from US 60 to Arizona Farms Road and Segment 2 from Arizona Farms Road to I-10.
	In 2023, ADOT began a Tier 2 study for the North-South Segment 1 between US 60 and Arizona Farms Road, which is ongoing. ADOT is conducting a Tier 2 EIS and Design Concept Report for Segment 2 of the North-South corridor between Arizona Farms Road and I-10, which is the focus of this meeting.
4. Tier 1 Studies vs Tier 2 Studies	The previous Tier 1 study evaluated a broad study area and several potential corridors. The outcome of that study was ADOT selecting a single 1,500-footwide North South corridor to move forward for evaluation in Tier 2 studies.
	The Tier 2 study is focused on identifying and evaluating potential 400-foot-wide freeway alignment alternatives within the selected Tier 1 corridor, as well as interchange locations and other features, such as bridges, in order to identify a preferred alternative for the proposed highway.
5. Study Area	This study will focus on Segment 2 of the North South corridor, which extends approximately 31 miles from Arizona Farms Road to I-10 near Eloy.
	This study is coordinating with the North South Segment 1 study efforts, which are also underway.

6. Study Goals	As mentioned previously, this study will identify and evaluate alignment alternatives within the corridor and narrow to a 400-foot freeway alignment. Proposed interchange locations will be identified and we will develop design concepts for the freeway alignment, interchanges and other design features as part of a Design Concept Report. In addition, we will prepare draft and final environmental documents, which will evaluate the environmental considerations of the alternatives and determine a Preferred Build Alternative. The Preferred Build Alternative will be compared to a No Build – or Do-Nothing Option – in the draft environmental document and DCR for further detailed evaluation and public comment.
	The final environmental document and DCR will identify the Preferred Alternative, either a build alternative or the no build alternative, which documents the agency's decision on how to move forward. If a preferred build alternative is selected, this would allow ADOT to move forward with design and right-of-way acquisition once funding is available.
7. Study Purpose and Need	The purpose and need for the North-South corridor that was defined during the Tier 1 study is to establish a continuous, access-controlled, north-to-south transportation corridor that would:  • Improve access to future activity centers  • Improve regional mobility  • Improve north-to-south connectivity  • Integrate the region's transportation network  • Address existing and future population and employment growth and  • provide an alternative to avoid congestion on I-10  The North-South Segment 2 study will further refine this purpose and need
8. Tier 2 Environmental Review Process	along the corridor from Arizona Farms Road to I-10.  This project will prepare a Tier 2 environmental study in compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act. The environmental document will address the purpose and need for the project, document the alternatives considered and evaluated, address the environmental impacts and planned mitigation, document coordination efforts with governmental agencies and the public, and include documentation of the comments received.
9. NEPA Disclosure	ADOT has assumed the Federal Highway Administration's responsibility for carrying out the National Environmental Policy Act environmental reviews and approvals per the executed agreement dated June 25, 2024, between the Federal Highway Administration and ADOT. As part of this project ADOT serves as the lead agency and has the authority to approve this project.
10. Study Engineering Considerations	This study will investigate a number of items including the existing and future traffic operations, corridor alignment alternatives, traffic interchange locations and access, drainage, structures, utilities, right-of-way impacts, project costs and constructability. An implementation plan will be developed and a draft and final DCR will be completed. We will be evaluating all environmental impacts of the alternatives and conducting outreach efforts to gather input from the public, agencies and tribal nations.

11. Environmental Considerations	The primary purpose of the environmental study is to investigate and document the environmental considerations, as well as avoidance, minimization, and mitigation efforts, for a recommended improvement option. This Tier 2 study will focus on the 1,500-foot corridor and the environmental considerations include a long list of items, which are shown on this slide, and are required for any environmental study. To name a few, we'll be assessing any impacts to cultural resources; parks, recreation areas, and wildlife refuges; wildlife connectivity; biology; air quality and noise; hazardous materials; property impacts; and floodplains and drainage. These items will be evaluated in detail in the environmental study, and we'll identify mitigation strategies, as needed.
12. Corridor Features	The graphic on the right shows some of the existing features along the study corridor. From north to south, the proposed corridor crosses the Copper Basin Railway, North Side Canal, Gila River, Florence Village (Tohono O'odham Nation), Pima Lateral, Casa Grande Canal, Florence-Casa Grande Canal Extension, Picacho Reservoir, Santa Rosa Canal, McClellan Wash and Union Pacific Railroad, and many other features. Segment 2 is served by I-10, several state highways, including SR 87, SR 287, and SR 79, and a limited number of existing arterial roadways, including Arizona Farms Road, Hunt Highway and Attaway Road. Major and minor collectors carry the remainder of local and regional traffic in Segment 2.
13. Corridor Features	The majority of land in Segment 2 is privately owned. However, Segment 2 also includes State Trust Land owned by the Arizona State Land Department (ASLD).  Land use in this segment includes scattered residences and master-planned communities, open space, a solar energy facility, agricultural lands, commercial and manufacturing sites and sand and gravel operations.
14. Corridor Features	This map shows the existing and future planned arterial street network based on Pinal County's current transportation planning map.  Future arterial roadway segments are shown in green. Projects in construction are shown in yellow. Planned improvements include intersection upgrades, resurfacing, roadway widening, and the addition of turn lanes. Future projects include upgrading existing roadways to improve connectivity to the planned State Route 505. The study team will coordinate with municipal project partners to understand their circulation planning efforts and assess opportunities for access to the proposed State Route 505.

#### Several potential traffic interchange locations were identified during the 15. Potential Traffic previous Tier 1 study. They include Arizona Farms Road, Hunt Highway, State Interchanges Route 287, Martin Road, Bartlett Road, Kleck Road, Steele Road, Selma Highway, Hanna Road, Houser Road and Interstate 10. These locations will be reviewed and refined as part of the current study, and design concepts will be developed at each location to evaluate potential configurations of each interchange. 16. Community Input received from the previous Tier 1 study indicated the community is concerned about coordination with recent and ongoing projects and studies, Concerns Expressed in Tier 1 utility and railroad impacts, noise impacts, impacts to surrounding Study communities and properties and environmental impacts. We will continue to gather input throughout the study process as we develop, refine and evaluate alternatives for the corridor. Other Studies ADOT is coordinating with several current or previous studies. ADOT is currently conducting a Phoenix to Tucson Intercity Passenger Rail Corridor Study which will prepare a Service Development Plan for proposed passenger rail service along a 158-mile corridor between the greater Phoenix and Tucson regions. This effort will build upon the previous Passenger Rail Corridor Tier 1 EIS study and Record of Decision completed in 2016, which identified the selected rail corridor. Both the 2016 Arizona Passenger Rail and the North-South Corridor Tier 1 Records of Decision recognize the need to preserve flexibility for multimodal solutions, including potential co-location of passenger rail within or adjacent to the SR 505 corridor. The current study area for the Phoenix-Tucson Intercity Passenger Rail Corridor is focused on following the existing Union Pacific Railroad corridor. However, the 2016 Arizona Passenger Rail Record of Decision allows for optional routing in Pinal County—consistent with the proposed North-South Corridor—particularly if challenges arise along existing railroad corridors due to cultural or other constraints. The SR 287/SR 87 corridor profile study is in its final stages, and includes quantitative analysis of pavement conditions, bridge infrastructure, mobility, freight and safety, to meet a desired level of performance. The study includes modernization and spot improvement recommendations for SR 87 between I-10 and the SR 87 and SR 287 interchange Potential expansion is being considered for the segment between SR 287 and Gilbert Road, which lies within the Gila River Indian Community. The study is scheduled to be completed later this summer.

#### 18. Study Schedule

The study schedule has several opportunities for public input. We are currently in the data collection phase where we are evaluating refinements to the original Tier 1 Purpose and need, completing initial technical studies, and will soon identify a preliminary range of alternatives. This will be followed by the release of the Notice of Intent, or NOI, which is formal initiation of the environmental study, where we refine the preliminary alternatives to develop a reasonable range of alternatives to study in the EIS. We will then prepare a draft environmental study and DCR, which will compare the Preferred Build Alternative with a No Build Alternative.

Ultimately, based on technical analysis and public, agency and tribal governments input, the study team will develop the draft environmental document and DCR, which will identify the Preferred Alternative. Following the release of the Draft documents and comment periods, a Record of Decision will be issued, representing ADOT's decision on the Selected Alternative and how to move forward with the proposed project. We anticipate this entire study to take approximately three years.

It's important to note that at each of the three major milestones, prior to the release of the final documents, there will be opportunities for the public to review the current alternatives being evaluated and provide input or comments.

We are here at our first milestone of the study to gather your input on what should be considered during refinement pf the purpose and need, development of preliminary alternatives for the North-South alignment, interchange locations and other features. As the study progresses, we will have additional opportunities for public input through public meetings and hearings.

#### 19. Project Schedule and Regional Planning

There is no timeline to construct the North-South corridor as it is not currently funded for design or construction. Funding would need to be identified to advance the project to design, and/or right of way acquisition, to be able to make a final decision, or issue the Record of Decision on a North-South corridor Segment 2 preferred alternative.

Regional transportation planning processes for identification of funding and the progression of projects like the proposed State Route 505 is overseen by metropolitan planning organizations — which include the Maricopa Association of Governments, Sun Corridor Metropolitan Planning Organization, as well as Pinal County - in coordination with ADOT. Once funding is secured the project can be programmed for the next phases of development, including design, right-of-way acquisition and construction.

As mentioned previously, your input will help us develop a range of potential alternatives that will be shared for public review and comment when the Notice of Intent is published. 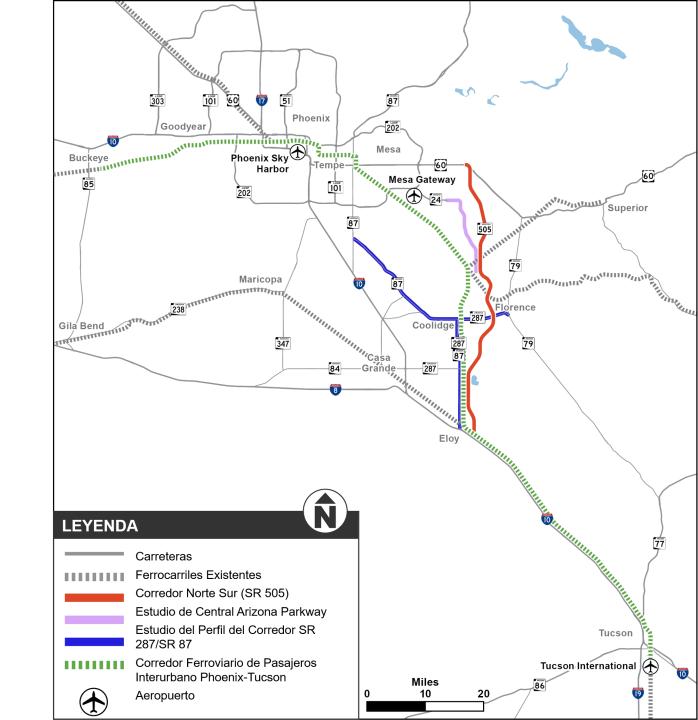

#### 17. Otros estudios

ADOT actualmente está llevando a cabo un Estudio del Corredor Ferroviario Interurbano de Pasajeros de Phoenix a Tucson que preparará un Plan de Desarrollo de Servicios para el servicio ferroviario de pasajeros propuesto a lo largo de un corredor de 158 millas entre las regiones metropolitanas de Phoenix y Tucson. Este esfuerzo se basará en el estudio anterior de EIS de Nivel 1 del Corredor Ferroviario de Pasajeros y el Registro de Decisión completado en 2016, que identificó el corredor ferroviario seleccionado.

Tanto el Ferrocarril de Pasajeros de Arizona de 2016 como el Corredor nivel Norte-Sur 1 Registro de Decisión reconocen la necesidad de preservar la flexibilidad para las soluciones multimodales, incluida la posible ubicación conjunta del tren de pasajeros dentro o adyacente al corredor SR 505. El área de estudio actual para el Corredor Ferroviario Interurbano de Pasajeros Phoenix-Tucson se centra en seguir el corredor existente del Ferrocarril Union Pacific. Sin embargo, el Registro de Decisión del Ferrocarril de Pasajeros de Arizona de 2016 permite una ruta opcional en el condado de Pinal, de acuerdo con el Corredor Norte-Sur propuesto, particularmente si surgen desafíos a lo largo de los corredores ferroviarios existentes debido a limitaciones culturales o de otro tipo.

El estudio del perfil del corredor SR 287 / SR 87 se encuentra en sus etapas finales e incluye un análisis cuantitativo de las condiciones del pavimento, la infraestructura del puente, la movilidad, la carga y la seguridad, para cumplir con el nivel deseado de rendimiento. El estudio incluye recomendaciones de modernización y mejoras puntuales para la SR 87 entre la I-10 y el intercambio de la SR 87 y la SR 287. Se está considerando una posible expansión para el segmento entre la SR 287 y Gilbert Road, que se encuentra dentro de la comunidad indígena del río Gila. El estudio está programado para completarse a finales de este verano.

#### 18. Horario de estudio

El programa de estudio tiene varias oportunidades para la opinión pública. Actualmente estamos en la fase de recopilación de datos en la que estamos evaluando los refinamientos del propósito y la necesidad originales del Nivel 1, completando los estudios técnicos iniciales y pronto identificaremos una gama preliminar de alternativas. A esto le seguirá la publicación del Aviso de Intención, o NOI, que es el inicio formal del estudio ambiental, donde refinamos las alternativas preliminares para desarrollar una gama razonable de alternativas para estudiar en el EIS. Luego prepararemos un borrador del estudio ambiental y DCR, que comparará la Alternativa de Construcción Preferida con una Alternativa de No Construcción.

En última instancia, con base en el análisis técnico y los aportes del público, la agencia y los gobiernos tribales, el equipo de estudio desarrollará el borrador del documento ambiental y el DCR, que identificará la Alternativa Preferida. Tras la publicación de los documentos preliminares y los períodos de comentarios, se emitirá un Registro de Decisión, que representa la decisión de ADOT sobre la Alternativa Seleccionada y cómo seguir adelante con el proyecto propuesto. Anticipamos que todo este estudio tomará aproximadamente tres años.

Es importante tener en cuenta que en cada uno de los tres hitos principales, antes de la publicación de los documentos finales, habrá oportunidades para que el público revise las alternativas actuales que se están evaluando y brinde información o comentarios.

Estamos aquí en nuestro primer hito del estudio para recopilar su opinión sobre lo que debe considerarse durante el refinamiento del propósito y la necesidad, el desarrollo de alternativas preliminares para la alineación Norte-Sur, las ubicaciones de intercambio y otras características. A medida que avance el estudio, tendremos oportunidades adicionales para la opinión pública a través de reuniones y audiencias públicas.

# 19. Cronograma del proyecto y planificación regional

No hay un cronograma para construir el corredor Norte-Sur, ya que actualmente no está financiado para el diseño o la construcción. Sería necesario identificar fondos para avanzar en el diseño del proyecto y/o la adquisición del derecho de paso, para poder tomar una decisión final, o emitir el Registro de Decisión sobre una alternativa preferida del Segmento 2 del corredor Norte-Sur.

Los procesos regionales de planificación del transporte para la identificación de fondos y la progresión de proyectos como la propuesta de la Ruta Estatal 505 son supervisados por organizaciones de planificación metropolitana, que incluyen la Asociación de Gobiernos de Maricopa, la Organización de Planificación Metropolitana Sun Corridor y el Condado de Pinal, en coordinación con ADOT. Una vez que se asegura la financiación, el proyecto se puede programar para las siguientes fases de desarrollo, incluido el diseño, la adquisición del derecho de paso y la construcción.

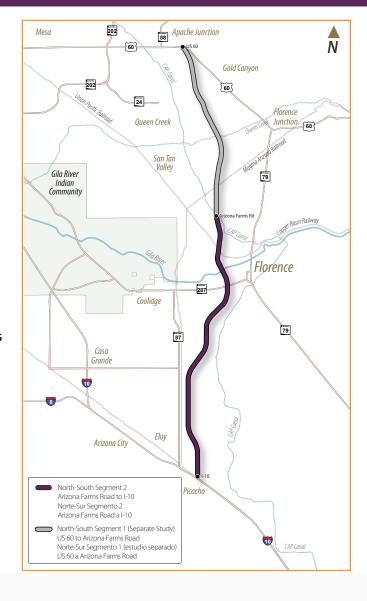

#### **Meeting Purpose**

To introduce the North-South Corridor Study Segment 2 Tier 2 Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) and Design Concept Report (DCR) study and gather agency input to inform the development of alternatives and environmental studies.

#### **Background**

The North-South Corridor Study Tier 1 EIS was completed in August 2021 and identified a 1,500-foot corridor in which a new freeway would potentially be constructed. At this time ADOT is completing a Tier 2 EIS and DCR for the 50-mile corridor. The Tier 2 study is divided into two segments. This project is Segment 2, located between Arizona Farms Road and I-10 near Eloy. Segment 1 from US 60 to Arizona Farms Road (separate EIS study) is ongoing as well.

#### **Study Goals**

The goals of the study are to evaluate alignment alternatives within the Tier 1 corridor, determine proposed interchange locations, and develop design concepts for the freeway and associated features. The study will result in a Tier 2 Environmental Impact Statement and Design Concept Report, which will identify a Preferred Alternative.

#### **Purpose and Need**

During the Tier 1 Study, the Purpose and Need were developed. The project is needed because there is insufficient infrastructure to accommodate the ongoing and planned population growth. In addition, there is a lack of regional connectivity between the metropolitan areas of Tucson and Phoenix, and throughout Pinal County, Arizona. There are only fragmented roads with limited options in the vicinity of the North-South Segment 2 corridor.

The purpose of the project is to provide a continuous access-controlled facility that can accommodate the existing and future population, access to activity centers, improve mobility, relieve I-10 congestion, improve north-south connectivity, and provide a critical missing link to the transportation network.

The Tier 2 EIS will refine and build on the Purpose and Need identified in the Tier 1 study.

#### **Tier 2 Environmental Process**

The Tier 2 environmental review will be conducted in compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). The environmental study will document the project's purpose and need, the alternatives considered, the environmental impacts and mitigation strategies, and the coordination efforts with agencies and the public. Environmental considerations include cultural resources, parks and recreation areas, wildlife connectivity, biology, air quality, noise, hazardous materials, property impacts, and water resources. Engineering considerations will address traffic operations, alignment alternatives, interchange access, drainage, structures, utilities, right-of-way, costs, constructability, and implementation planning.

#### **Corridor Features**

The corridor crosses several key features, including the Copper Basin Railway, Gila River, Picacho Reservoir, and multiple canals and highways such as SR 87, SR 287, and SR 79. Land use in Segment 2 includes a mix of private and State Trust lands, residential developments, agricultural areas, solar energy facilities, and industrial sites. The study will also consider the future arterial street network as planned by Pinal County and local jurisdictions.

#### **Potential Interchange Locations**

Ten potential interchange locations were identified in the Tier 1 study, including Arizona Farms Road, SR 287, Martin Road, and I-10. These locations will be reviewed and refined during the Tier 2 process, and design concepts will be developed to evaluate potential configurations.

#### **Coordination with Other Studies**

ADOT is coordinating this study with several other efforts, including the Phoenix-Tucson Intercity Passenger Rail Corridor Study and the SR 287/SR 87 Corridor Profile Study. These efforts ensure consistency and avoid conflicts with ongoing planning and infrastructure development.

#### **Community Concerns from Tier 1**

Community input from the Tier 1 study highlighted concerns about coordination with other studies, potential impacts to utilities and railroads, noise, effects on surrounding communities

and properties, and potential impacts to water resources and cultural resources. These concerns will continue to be addressed as the study progresses.

#### Schedule

The study is currently in the preliminary scoping phase, with data collection and refinement of the purpose and need underway. The Notice of Intent will formally initiate the environmental process, followed by alternatives development, preparation of the draft and final EIS and DCR, and ultimately a Record of Decision. The full study is expected to take approximately three years, with multiple opportunities for agency, tribal, and public input throughout.

#### **Agency and Tribal Involvement**

Several agencies have been invited and accepted as Cooperating Agencies, including the Arizona Game and Fish Department, Bureau of Reclamation, Pinal County, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the Western Area Power Administration. Participating Agencies include additional local, state, and federal entities, as well as the Ak-Chin Indian Community, Gila River Indian Community, Pascua Yaqui Tribe, Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community, San Carlos Apache Tribe, and Tohono O'odham Nation.

Cooperating and Participating Agencies are expected to provide input on the purpose and need, range of alternatives, study methodologies, and environmental concerns. They are also asked to participate in meetings and provide timely review of project materials. Cooperating Agencies are specifically requested to provide early and meaningful input on alternatives and methodologies, participate in coordination meetings and field reviews, and identify any significant issues within their jurisdiction. Participating Agencies are expected to share relevant information and identify any environmental concerns.

#### **Questions/Input**

During the question-and-answer session, several agency representatives provided comments and raised considerations for the study team.

Kyle Varvel from the San Carlos Irrigation Project (SCIP) noted that SCIP manages both irrigation and power utilities in the area. He mentioned that while there are a few major features, there are also many minor facilities within the corridor. SCIP has its own encroachment process and must also comply with NEPA and Section 106 requirements. He offered to provide a KMZ file of SCIP's infrastructure and emphasized the need for close coordination with the design team.

Zac Appleton from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) advised that when determining the locations of interchanges, the study should consider all reasonably foreseeable development to the maximum practicable extent. He referenced an example from Gold Canyon along US 60, where a lack of foresight in interchange planning led to the highway functioning more like an arterial road due to poor connectivity.

Stephen Eich from Arizona Public Service (APS) shared that APS is planning a new transmission line that will parallel the future SR 505 within the 1,500-foot corridor. He expressed interest in continued coordination with ADOT and noted that APS will be presenting the project to the Arizona Corporation Commission in September.

Benjamin Navarro expressed appreciation for the EPA's comments and indicated a strong interest in how traffic interchanges will support the regional transportation plan.

Jason Abplanalp, land manager for Copper Basin Railway (CBRY) and ASARCO, stated that CBRY will be conducting siding expansion projects along the rail line in Florence. He requested to remain engaged in discussions related to railroad bridge and crossing design where the proposed SR 505 alignment crosses north of Florence. He also noted that the federal railroad right-of-way at this location is 200 feet wide and was originally licensed in 1904.

David Malewitz from the City of Eloy inquired whether the project cost estimates would include consideration for establishing quiet zones at railroad crossings, particularly in light of anticipated residential growth. The study team responded that noise will be evaluated as part of the environmental analysis, and that railroad crossings and other relevant features will be considered in that context.

Finally, Stephen Eich (APS) asked where more information could be found about the Phoenix–Tucson Intercity Passenger Rail Corridor Study. The study team directed participants to the ADOT website and provided a link for reference.
