In just two weeks, ADOT has doubled the number of employees teleworking in multiple departments around the state.

Teleworking tips

In recent weeks, many ADOT employees have begun working from home due to COVID-19.

Teleworking allows us to provide essential services to our internal customers and to the public, but it does require some adjustment.

- Schedule weekly standing meeting times and daily chats with your manager and team.
