Transit vs. Transportation

- Terms often used interchangeably, especially among your stakeholders, clients and passengers
- Transportation generally refers to the transport of goods, people, or animals through modes like air, land (roads and rail) pipeline, space, water, cable, etc
- Transit generally refers to the movement of people from one place to another

How Public Transit is Funded



- No public transit trip is "free" even if no cost to the passenger; someone or some entity is paying for every trip
- No public transit system in the United States pays for itself
- "Farebox Recovery" is still often the metric used to determine efficiency and community benefit

How Public Transit is Funded in the US

- Federal Programs <u>FAST Act</u>
- State Revenues Property taxes, income taxes, sales taxes, lottery funds, clean air act funds
- Local Revenues <u>General funds</u>, user fees, license fees, <u>sales taxes</u>, business activity taxes (such as lodger's taxes and the like), <u>advertising</u>, fees for service
- Investment Instruments Bonds
- Public-Private Partnerships (PPP or P3)


How Much Do States Spend of Their Own Dollars on Transit?



Public Transit Funding: Operating and Capital Federal funding sources cover mostly capital expenses

- Federal operating funds are very limited
- Fares do not cover all operating costs
- Local funding sources are meant to help subsidize the operating costs in most locations
- Most boards and councils will push for reduction in operating costs and often use this as a reporting metric

Federal Transit Administration

- Federal funding agency within the USDOT
- Arizona in FTA Region 9
- Receives annual funding from the appropriations committee within the US Congress
- FTA announces annual apportionments to each state based on formulas (performance data, population, etc)




- (1) <u>Determining Minimum Useful Life for Federally Assisted Property</u>. The recipient should identify the method used to determine the minimum useful life. Acceptable methods to determine minimum useful life include but are not limited to:
 - Generally accepted accounting principles;
 - b) Independent evaluation;
 - c) Manufacturer's estimated useful life;
 - d) Internal Revenue Service guidelines;
 - e) Industry standards;
 - Recipient experience;
 - g) The recipient's independent auditor who needs to provide his or her concurrence that the useful life assigned to the property is reasonable for depreciation purposes; and
 - h) Proven useful life developed at a federal test facility.
- (2) FTA Minimum Useful Life Policy for Rolling Stock and Ferries. The useful life of rolling stock and ferries begins on the date the vehicle is placed in revenue service and continues until it is removed from revenue service. The minimum useful life in years refers to total time in transit revenue service, not time spent stockpiled or otherwise unavailable for regular transit use. The minimum useful life in miles refers to total miles in transit revenue service. Non-revenue miles and periods of extended removal from service do not count towards useful life. Changes in operating circumstances, including unforeseen difficulty maintaining vehicles,

FTA Circulars

ADOT Policy Based on Circular Guidance:

ADOT maintains a lien on all vehicles still in revenue service; agencies must get it approved by ADOT before removing from service.



Modes of public transportation – Deviated Fixed Route

- Hybrid of fixed-route and ADA Complementary Paratransit service
- Provides riders the reliability of fixed-route service
- The flexibility of demand response



Modes of public transportation – Deviated Flex Route

- Deviations are provided on route to everyone
- Same level of service as fixed route system
- Used by majority of 5311 agencies

Intercity - General Information

- ADOT awards 5311(f) intercity to eligible agencies
- Agencies must make meaningful connections to the intercity network
 - Must begin and/or end in Urban areas, but must demonstrate significant ridership and benefits for rural residents to be eligible for 5311(f) funding
- Partnership with Intercity Provider can provide matching funds



Intercity - National Intercity Map

- Developed by the Bureau of Transportation Studies
- Agencies publish data compliant to the General Transit Feed Specification (GTFS)
 - -includes operational information about stops, routes, trips, schedules, fares, and transfers
- Help interline systems and services
- Aids in planning improvements

5310 Program Overview

The 5310 program "makes federal resources available to improve mobility for seniors and individuals with disabilities by removing barriers to transportation service and expanding transportation mobility options."

- Federal Transit Administration
- Formula funding from the FTA goes to Direct Recipients
 - State Transit Agencies, Local Governments, Public Transit Authorities, Tribes
- Participation in coordination plan is a requirement of federal law
- ADOT selects subrecipient projects based on a competitive application process

5310 in Arizona

- Approximately 50 agencies apply to ADOT each funding opportunity
- Prioritize operating funding for agencies who serve the public as well as their own clients
- Providing funding for Capital Equipment, Mobility Management,
 Preventive Maintenance, and Operations
- Funding decisions are made by ADOT with input from regional partners


Coordination and Mobility Management

- FTA requires participation in regional coordinated plan in any region where you seek funding
- Coordinated Plan is managed by each regional COG or MPO
- Different regions have different requirements for participation; must work with Mobility Manager to join
- Mobility Managers provide technical assistance, program guidance, training opportunities and more



ADOT's Application Process

- Notice of Funds availability (NOFA): Document issued by funder (ADOT) to solicit proposals
 - Issued on our webpage and announced via email and Egrants Grant Management System
 - Provides available funding amounts, application timeline,
 - Synonymous with Request for Proposals (RFP)

Common Metrics to Monitor

- Ridership
- On-time Performance (often arriving or departing within 5 minutes of published schedule)
- Complaints
- Missed trips/miles
- Maintenance (failures, downtime, percent of fleet down, etc)

Leveraging Resources - In-kind match

- In-Kind match use of donations of goods or services in lieu of cash
- Assign a fair market cash value to that donation and use it to increase your reimbursement
- Cannot be used for match of rolling stock
- Allows transit agencies/departments flexibility in how their funding is used; eliminating the need to always request additional funding from the General Fund




